





Monday's Not Coming by Tiffany D. Jackson





Piecing Me Together by Renée Watson




Rest in Power: The Enduring Life of Trayvon Martin by Sybrina Fulton and Tracy Martin




The Education of Margot Sánchez by Lilliam Rivera






After The Shot Drops by Randy Ribay





Anger Is a Gift by Mark Oshiro





Calling My Name by Liara Tamani


Darius the Great Is Not Okay by Adib Khorram





Give Me Some Truth by Eric Gansworth




Long Way Down by Jason Reynolds
